Our EYFS Intent Statement



Parents as Partners

We recognise the importance of parents and carers in a child's developing stages. As a primary care provider, you are your child's first educators and we greatly value any input, opinions and information you can share with us about your child's learning and progress.

To support this, we will be holding parent consultation meetings at the beginning of September. These meetings will be individual parent appointment slots (please do not bring your child) and will be an opportunity for you to tell us all about your child in a one to one 20-minute appointment.

We provide many other opportunities for parents and carers to take an active part in their child's education. These include:

- □ Yearly parent assemblies to share our class' success and topic work
- □ Parents' evenings
- □ Sporting Events
- □ Regular newsletters
- Parent texts and emails (please make sure the office have your up to date mobile phone number and email address to receive this useful information)
- Rudston App (download the app from the app store and you will receive individual log in details from our admin team)

Most importantly, our family ethos is central to our school and as such, we operate an `Open-Door Policy' where parents are actively encouraged to meet with staff to discuss any concerns at the earliest opportunity. Our staff are available at the end of the school day after the children have been collected, to answer any questions or you can speak to the office to arrange an appointment. Mrs Cavanagh is our EYFS Phase leader and can be contacted via the office to answer any questions or address any issues you may have.

Preparing your child for school

As your child will now be part of a class, they will need to become more independent. It will make starting school much easier and happier if they are able to do as many things as possible for themselves.

What should he/she be able to do? Can he/she...

- □ Put on and fasten their own coat?
- □ Use the toilet independently and ask to go there?
- □ Tidy up after himself/herself?

- Recognise their own name? Please tell your child's teacher if their name is abbreviated in any way.
- □ Feed himself/herself?
- □ Share toys and equipment?
- □ Hold a pencil correctly?
- □ Sing some nursery rhymes?
- □ Practise counting to 20?
- □ Listen well and follow simple instructions?

How can I help my child prepare for school?

- Encourage your child to be as independent as possible even if it takes far longer for them to get ready.
- Establish sensible bedtime routines which get your child ready for sleep, e.g. sharing a bedtime story
- □ Allowing time in the morning to make sure your child arrives promptly and is ready to learn



 Never threaten them with school! Be positive. Support us by reinforcing the importance of regular attendance

What can I do with my child before they start school?

- Give your child as many varied experiences as possible: drawing, painting, cooking, singing, making models,
- □ playing games, jigsaws, etc
- Get them used to: pencils, crayons, felt pens, chalks, paints, play dough, scissors
- □ Share stories, books and rhymes.
- □ Count everything and share things out.
- □ Use lots of everyday counting opportunities —cup, plate, knife, for and spoon for each person.
- Talk to them all of the time. Name familiar things and discuss what they see around them and what things are for. Talk about what you see when you are out and about. Watch people work and discuss what they are doing.

Morning Procedures

Children enter their classroom from the barn area situated on the reception outdoor learning area. The gates and doors will be open at 8.45am for the start of the school day. On the first day parents are welcome to bring their child to the barn door, after this time, we ask parents to say goodbye to their child at the gate. Children are not permitted to play outdoor learning area before school for safety and insurance reasons, even if supervised by parents. Please encourage your child to stay nearby and say goodbye to you before entering school. Please consider residents when parking outside school. It is a good idea to park a little way from school and walk to school. Parking away from school helps maintain clean air, makes roads safer for children around school and provides physical activity.

Collecting your child

At the end of the school day you are able to access the school at 3.15pm when the teacher opens the gate and classroom doors. The children will wait on the carpet until the teacher calls them to the door. In the first few weeks we will be getting to know the important adults who are collecting the children so this may take a little longer to ensure all children are safely handed over to their special grown up. It is vital that you inform us if someone different is collecting your child. If we are unsure, they will remain at school until we can contact you. Under 16's are not permitted to collect children under 7 years old.



School Dinners

At Rudston we use 'Food for Thought' to provide our school meals service. We chose FFT because they provide a commitment to using locally sourced, organic where possible, and environmentally sound raw ingredients for our meals.

The meals are cooked entirely on school premises by kitchen staff who are trained by both the school and FFT. The menus are carefully balanced by nutritionists and the children are surveyed to see what improvements can be made.

Our children deserve great school dinners they enjoy eating and that are healthy as well. We work within the curriculum to ensure that children are not only fed well but are food wise too. Food tasting sessions with parents, assemblies and sessions in class are all part of our whole school approach.

The menus change with the seasons.

Children have lunch at 11.45 and all reception staff support the children in the canteen. We can see our menus on the school website

Children can have hot dinner or packed lunch (no chocolate, sweets, nuts or fizzy drinks). We expect all children bringing packed lunch to make sure it conforms to our Healthy Eating policy. A healthy packed lunch should include some of the following:

□ fruit - straight from bush or tree!

□ raw vegetables (e.g. carrots, cherry tomatoes and cucumber) or dried fruit

□ savoury sandwiches (not jam or chocolate spread)

□ a yoghurt or fruit dessert

Please note that due to children's allergies no nuts are allowed in school, including packed lunches. This includes chocolate spreads, granola bars and biscuits which include nuts. Please check the packaging of products closely. We appreciate that this is an additional thing to check and we know that you recognise the importance of it. We do have to insist we are a nut free school. I know if this was your child you would expect that we all help, especially as it is a life-threatening condition.

All children under seven are entitled to universal free school meals. However registering for free school meals can benefit your child and the school. Eligibility for free school meals also provides discounted school trips, visitors and school led after school clubs for your child. Snack Time

Every child qualifies for free school milk until the term they turn 5. After this time, parents can choose to pay for their child to continue having milk. This is paid directly to Cool Milk.

Snack time is available during the afternoon session. Children are offered a piece of fresh fruit, a range of crackers, breadsticks and raisins. Snack, which is additional to the free milk entitlement, is charged at £15.00 per term (£45 per year). This is payable via Parent Pay on a termly or yearly basis.

A Healthy School

Children need to bring a named plastic water bottle to school every day. Water is essential to hydrate your child's brain and to help them to learn. Bottles must only contain water. Juice and flavoured waters are not allowed. If your child brings anything other than water the bottle will be returned to you at the end of the day, unused.

Sweets and chocolate are not allowed to be brought into school, including in packed lunches.

Attendance

Please arrive on time for school at 8.45am so your child does not miss the start of lessons. If your child is late, please bring them to the main office so they can be registered for the day. Lateness is recorded and can have an impact on your child's learning. If your child is not attending school for medical reasons please telephone the school office no later than 9.30am or inform us via the Rudston App providing the reason for their absence each day.

Illness

If your child is ill during the school day, then they will need to be collected as soon as possible. Please make sure the office has all the telephone numbers necessary to contact you at either work or home. Please keep your child off school if they are unwell. In the case of sickness and or diarrhoea, your child should remain at home for at least 48 hours after the last episode of illness.

Medical appointments

It is helpful to know in advance about any medical appointments. Please request an appointment card when making your child's appointment which can be shown to the staff in the office. Please note that if your child misses registration for a medical appointment this will be recorded as an authorised absence.



Medicines

Designated staff will administer medication to children only when it has been prescribed by a medical professional. Medication should have a prescription label with the child's name and dosage clearly visible. You will be required to complete a consent form at the office when handing over the medication.

Health care plans

If your child has any continuous medical needs please contact Mrs Mulvaney our SENDCo to complete an individual healthcare plan.

Asthma

For children with asthma, please provide the school with a clearly labelled inhaler stating your child's name and dosage. If a spacer is required it is the parents' responsibility to provide this. Please ensure all inhalers are replaced periodically, according to their expiry date.

Parent Consent Forms

We will ask you to complete a form at the start of the year giving us consent for local trips, photographic consent and for emergencies where a child becomes seriously unwell or injured then the school requires your signature to act 'in loco parentis' until parents or relatives are informed.

Photographs and Videos

We often use our online resources, such as our website and Twitter, to share our children's learning. We would love to share your child's journey through photographs and videos. To allow us to do so, there is a consent form giving consent to capture precious moments such as sports days and class assemblies!

Visits

For visits further afield we will ask for a consent form to be completed for the visit. Most visits are subsidised by the school but parents are asked to contribute towards cost. The cost of transport has dramatically risen over the last few years and it has become necessary to increase voluntary contributions because of this.

Donations

Donations to school can be made via ParentPay and help the school not only to buy extra resources and provide additional experiences for children. Please help us to continue providing this support by providing whatever you can.

Complaints

If you have any issues or complaints your child's teacher should be approached first. If you do not feel that a satisfactory solution has been found then please speak to the Phase Leader, Mrs Cavanagh. If the situation is still not concluded it will be referred to Mrs Mulvaney, Deputy Head Teacher and then Miss Walters, Head Teacher.

Dogs

Dogs are not allowed anywhere on school premises, with the exception of guide dogs or assist dogs.



Term Time Holidays

From September 2013, Government regulations around holidays in term time changed. The regulations make it clear that schools may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. Applications for holidays in term time will be refused unless parents can demonstrate and prove there are exceptional circumstances relating to the holiday request. If you take your child out of school without permission this will be recorded as an unauthorised absence and noted on your child's record and may result in each parent being issued with a fixed penalty fine for each child taken out of school. Only the head teacher can authorise absences from school.

SEND

At Rudston Primary School we are committed to the equal inclusion of all pupils in all areas of primary school life. We recognise the diverse and individual needs of all our pupils and take into account the additional support required by those children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). We aim to provide a secure and accessible environment in which all our children can flourish and all contributions are considered and valued. Inclusion is a thread that runs through all of the activities at school. We understand the importance of discussing concerns that a child may have special educational needs with parents and carers. We value their opinions and recognise the importance of working together to achieve the best outcomes for your child. The Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator or SENDCo, is Mrs Mulvaney our Deputy Head Teacher. Class teachers can be

approached if you have any concerns and they may approach parents and carers to raise any problems your child may be having with their learning or wellbeing.

Child Protection

Every child is placed in the care of their class teacher and this should be the first person they turn to in times of need. Parents are asked to talk to staff if they have any worries or are concerned that something happening at home may affect their child's behaviour at school. If there are any domestic difficulties, please let us know so that we can ensure your child is given sympathetic attention. Our first concern is your child's welfare. The school has a commitment to the welfare and protection of all children in our care. The school's Child Protection Policy is there to help children as part of the overall school approach to safety. On occasions the school may need to contact other agencies before contacting the parent. The deputy head teacher, Mrs Mulvaney is the Child Protection Named Person. We have an Inclusion Team with trained staff who liaise with parents and outside agencies if needed. Our school is part of Operation Encompass. This is a police and education early intervention safeguarding partnership which supports children and young people who experience Domestic Abuse. Operation Encompass means that the police will share information about Domestic Abuse incidents with our school PRIOR to the start of the next school day when they have been called to a domestic incident. Learning in the Foundation Stage

Reception is where the excitement begins! Foundation stage children learn together in an environment which is developed around the children's interests. We pride ourselves on being an exciting and engaging place to be - encouraging our children to be independent learners through a range of practical activities. We follow a thematic curriculum which allows us to be creative with our lessons and let the children lead their own learning.

As our Foundation Stage children enter the classroom they learn primarily through a variety of play and real-life experiences. Our teaching is delivered through carefully planned tasks and guided key challenges. The children access their environment freely; however, they understand they must complete 'key challenges' throughout the day which will scaffold and extend their learning. Their development is tracked through detailed, daily observations and child-initiated interaction.

At Rudston Primary School we value the impact of reading on a child's development. We plan sequences of learning based on key quality texts and strive to encourage all children to develop a love a reading. We teach phonics using the Read Write Inc phonics scheme.

The EYFS Curriculum

In reception our Foundation Stage children follow the Early Years Foundation Stage Framework (EYFS). This curriculum is based upon four themes and principles.

The Unique Child - We understand that every child is an individual child who is capable in their own right. The holistic child has a variety of needs that need meeting over their time in the Foundation Stage.

Positive Relationships - Social interaction is key to children's development. Children become strong, independent learners; as well as scaffolding their learning through positive social interaction. **Enabling Environments** - Providing a safe, secure and stimulating base for your children is key to their development. The framework allows for experiences that respond to the child's individual needs/ interests; as well as developing a strong partnership between practitioners, parents and carers.

Learning and Development - Children develop and learn in different ways. The framework covers the education and care of all children in early years provision, including children with special educational needs and disabilities.

Early Learning Goals

Within `Development Matters' there are 3 prime areas of learning and 4 specific areas. This framework provides the basis of how we structure the setting, the activities and opportunities we provide; as well as how we assess your child's development. For each of these areas your child will have an 'Early Learning Goal' to work towards.

School Uniform

ALL children NEED:

□ a maroon jumper or cardigan with school logo

□ a white polo shirt

□ grey trousers, shorts, pinafore or skirt

□ A rain-proof coat

□ Flat supportive shoes (no laces, backless shoes, trainers, ballet style pumps or high heels)

PE days- Children will wear their PE uniform on PE days. You will be notified of your PE days in September.

- □ a maroon t-shirt with school logo
- □ maroon shorts
- □ tracksuit (sweatshirt and jog pants)
- □ plain trainers (no laces)
- □ no football kits or branded items with large logos

In summer

□ maroon shorts

□ trainers for outdoor games

Jewellery (including earrings) and nail varnish are not permitted.

All jumpers, trousers and P.E. kits look the same and you have a much better chance of your child coming home with their belongings if they are clearly labelled. Try to remember this throughout the school year too, when purchasing new items.

As our learning environment is both indoors and outdoors, we ask that you make sure your child is equipped for these areas at all times of the year. Please ensure their clothing is practical and suitable for the seasonal changes.

Waterproof jackets and winter clothing for cold weather; sun hat and protective clothing in the summer months.

We ask that sun cream is applied before the children get to school so that they are ready for the day.

Things to bring to school

□ Suitable coats—nothing too special as it is likely to get sandy, muddy or wet.

□ Hats, scarves and gloves.

□ Sun hats.

□ Water bottles.

□ Book bags

Homework and library books. Library books are for you to read to your child and are chosen by the children. These do not need recording in your child's reading record. RWI plastic wallet.

Please encourage your child not to bring toys and objects from home. These can get lost or broken and this can be upsetting for your child. Children are allowed one small keyring on their bag.

Helping Prepare your Child for School

Here at Rudston Primary School we go to great lengths to help your child be prepared for their next stage of learning; as well as developing the confidence and skills to be an independent learner. In preparation for school, here are some things you can do with your child to help them develop the basic skills on the road towards their Early Learning Goals.

Speaking

Speak clearly and confidently Model using the right words and set an example Speak in full sentences Use clear, simple directions for tasks and behaviours Engage in discussions with your child and allow them the time to speak without being interrupted Ask for their opinions Tell them about your day and ask about theirs.

Listening

Show your child how to be a good listener by listening to them and others Be patient—don't interrupt or finish their sentences for them Give them your full attention when they are speaking, showing them eye contact and good body language. Respond to what they are saying by asking questions or ask about their opinions. Listen to your child reading.

Number Skills

Count daily with your child Count objects, actions, numbers and a range of things.

Identify numbers wherever you go—a neighbour's house number or the number on a bus.

Help children putting numbers in order. Let children help with the tidying and sorting. Identify shapes around the home.

Writing

Encourage your child to mark make without feeling pressured.

Get your children colourful pens, gel pens and exciting new tools to encourage them to mark make.

Let children write their name on cards or letters.

If your child is already writing with a pen or pencil, support their pencil grip.

Behaviour

Agree clear and realistic rules—and stick to them. Give your child boundaries so they know what is expected of them.

Encourage your child to always say 'please' and 'thank you'.

Support the school rules.

Extending their learning

Link your child's learning to family activities Go to local museums, parks, wildlife reserves and into nature. Talk about the world around them and encourage them to ask questions.

Take time to listen to your child and explain things carefully, developing their understanding and vocabulary.

Organisation

Children like routine—so set regular times for bed, getting up, meals and family time. Check your child has their name in everything before they bring it in to school.

Help your child remember to bring everything—book bag, drinks bottle, reading book etc. Let your child take hold of their own things on the way to school—they will know where to put them

Lay your child's clothes out in the correct order each morning so they can dress themselves Children are expected to toilet themselves once they begin the Foundation Stage.

Out of Hours Club (OOH) Out of Hours Provision

Limited places are available for our Afterschool Club and Breakfast Club each day of the week for parents who may need to book a place. The places will be allocated on a first come first served basis. Please contact the manager, Natalie Smith on 07514 497676 or ideally, email her at outofhours@rudstonprimary.co.uk to discuss availability. All accounts must be in credit.



Breakfast club starts at 7.45am and is charged at £5.50 per session. Children are entitled to a choice of breakfast cereal, unlimited slices of toast with or without jam, a portion of fruit and a yoghurt.

After School is charged at £11.00 per session which includes a snack meal.

Activities Provision

At least one play worker led workshop is provided each day which take place in either in the main room, canteen or outdoors accordingly.

Free choice adult supervised sessions are provided daily and are resourced appropriately. This includes the option of indoor and outdoor play. Indoor sessions take place in the main room and include arts & crafts, construction, role play and board games.

Outdoor sessions take place in the school playground and sports field and include football, rounders, small playground equipment and the facilitation of playground games.
